RGST 200/ ANTH 202 – Introduction to the Study of Religion

Course Description: Study of religion through a comparative, cross-cultural, and interdisciplinary approach to humans' engagement with the sacred. Examines religions as complex systems that share certain fundamental common features.

Scheduled: 2022W Term 1 (Sep. – Dec. 2022) Tuesdays and Thursdays 11:00 – 12:30

Applicants must have a PhD (or be ABD in good standing – all PhD requirements except for the dissertation) in a related area. Preference will be given to applicants with post-secondary teaching experience and a record that provides evidence of teaching effectiveness in this or related fields.

Applicants should include with their letter of application:

- a C.V., which includes a record of experience and a detailed list of all post-secondary courses taught (course name and number, length, credit value, dates, and teaching responsibilities)
- a sample syllabus for this course
- evidence of teaching effectiveness (i.e., teaching evaluations, if available)
- two confidential letters of reference emailed directly to the program by the referees
